
## **ARTHUR FAMILY OF LAXFIRTH**

**Edward Arthur**, Chief Petty Officer, *SS Dundee*. Laxfirth, North Nesting. Decoration: D.C.M. Please see Robert John Anderson's sheet for details of SS *Dundee*.



**Robert Arthur**, Leading-Seaman Gunner, R.N.R., *SS Hebburn C.T.660.* Son of Edward and the late Eliz. Arthur, Laxfirth. Lost by the sinking of his ship 80 miles off Milford Haven, September 25th 1918, aged 42.

SS Hebburn was a collier and was torpedoed and sunk in the Atlantic Ocean 14 nautical miles (26 km) off Mine Head, Cornwall (51°40′N 7°13′W) by SM *UB-91* (Kaiserliche Marine) with the loss of six of her crew.

**George Arthur**. Master Mariner, *SS Glanton*. Sunk by German Raider *Karlsruhe* 1914. Twice torpedoed off Ireland and off England. Laxfirth, North Nesting.

SS Glanton was a British Merchant Steamer of 3,021 tons. On the 18th October 1914 when 195 miles SW (true) from St Paul Rocks she was captured by the German Light Cruiser SMS KarsIruhe and sunk by bombs/charges. Her crew were taken as prisoners of war.

Thomas John Arthur, Chief Officer, SS Roseden. Laxfirth, North Nesting.



SS Roseden

During World War Two, at 21.25 hours on 4<sup>th</sup> Feb 1940 the unescorted *Leo Dawson*, which was formerly *SS Roseden*, was hit aft by one torpedo from U-37 about 15 miles east of Bressay. The master and 34 crew members were lost. The ship had been missed by a first torpedo at 21.11 hours.

Their parents were Edward Arthur and Elizabeth Bruce, they had two sisters.
